

December 2020 Ministry Update

"Partnerships Empower Honduras Hurricane Relief"

[LaCeiba, Honduras]

■ The 2020 Atlantic hurricane season was one of the most active in recent history. Even so, one might expect to experience a direct hit from a major hurricane once in a lifetime, maybe twice. Twice in two weeks would be unheard of. And yet, that's exactly what the people of Honduras and Nicaragua experienced in the first two weeks of November.

Hurricane ETA made landfall in eastern Nicaragua and eastern Honduras on November 2 as a deadly Category 4 storm. The storm cut a north-westerly path through Nicaragua and Honduras on its way toward Guatemala and Belize, dumping 24-36 inches of rain in as many hours, washing away roads, bridges, and infrastructure. According to the UN, one of the hardest hit areas with the greatest rainfall was in the lower-lying terrain to the east, home to the Miskito people group and, providentially, to MAG's hospital and main mission base in the village of Rus Rus.

Against the backdrop of a presidential election, the US news media had virtually no coverage of the destruction, but international aid organizations, including Missionary Air Group, along with a host of ministry partners, sprang into action immediately. Relief flights launched from the US and emergency food distribution were underway. The first plane loads arrived in Rus Rus and then, just two days into the effort, flights had to be suspended due to the approach of a second, even stronger Category 5 storm, Hurricane IOTA, that arrived on November 17 along the very same track.

With the help of US and international partners, food and supplies entered Honduras through the international airport in LaCeiba and were then staged in the villages of Rus Rus and Ahuas, in the eastern department of Gracias A Dios. From there, distribution commenced to the hardest hit villages by means of smaller aircraft, by air drop, by four-wheel drive truck, on foot, on horseback, and even by way of dugout canoes to areas still impassible due to flooding. The most remarkable part of the entire operation was how many different ministry organizations came together to make it happen. Within days of the first storm, a coalition had formed consisting of MAG-US, MAG-Honduras, Agape Flights (Venice, FL), Feed the Hunger (Burlington, NC), AGAPE Guatemala, Mission Aviation Fellowship (Nampa, ID), the Moravian Church of Honduras, Midwest Food Bank (Fort Myers, FL) - eight different ministries from three different countries, all with one heart and purpose—to show compassion to those in need after the example of Jesus!

Relief efforts will be ongoing for months. An estimated 20,000 pounds of supplies will have been delivered through December, with another 50,000 pounds slated for January as containers begin to arrive. Besides food, the other critical needs have been for medicine, seed to enable crops to be replanted, water filters, mattresses, tin to replace roofs, and cleaning and hygiene supplies. PRAYER and CASH, in that order, will allow this effort to continue, accompanied by the Word of God and a credible Gospel empowered by tangible LOVE!
